In November 2007, Bishop Don relinquished his license in the Anglican Church of Canada and was received into the Anglican Province of the Southern Cone under Primate Gregory Venables. In becoming a bishop of the Southern Cone, he came out of retirement, resumed full-time episcopal ministry on a volunteer basis, and began to offer episcopal oversight to biblically faithful Canadian Anglican parishes. Bishop Donald is not only the diocesan Bishop and Moderator of ANIC (A diocese of ACNA) but also the Dean of ACNA serving under primate Archbishop Robert Duncan. Bishop Don retired from the Anglican Church of Canada in 2004 after 12 years as the Third Bishop of Eastern Newfoundland and Labrador. Prior to this, he served for 30 years in various parishes in Newfoundland and Labrador including a six year appointment as University Chaplain. In October 2009, Bishop Don was awarded an honorary Doctor of Divinity degree by Nashotah House Seminary.

Director, Anglican Network in Canada





Director, Anglican Network in Canada


The Rev Mike Stewart is rector of ANiC's St Matthew's Anglican Church in Abbotsford, BC.
