


Bishop Michael Nazir-Ali November 5th to 7th

Bishop Dr. Michael Nazir-Ali has led the church in both Pakistan and England, serving in the latter as Bishop of Rochester for fifteen years. He was the General Secretary of the Church Mission Society and was Bishop of Raiwind in Pakistan. He is also a faculty member at the London School of Theology and holds Fellowships at both Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Some of his primary areas of expertise include inter-faith relations, bioethics, ecumenism, and the mission of the church.
