3. Anglicans Adrift

The Anglican Communion is like a torn net, due to misshapen growth
a. The root: Liberal theology - attitudes of reverence and love, acquired from within the Christian tradition, now shaped by contemporary cultural pressures and processes (intellectual and societal)
Liberal theology has dominated seminaries for two generations, muffling conservative theology
b. The fruit: The world writes the agenda (women / racism / minorities / homosexuality)
