

The Workshop

Hiding the Bible in your Heart is a workshop consisting of two sessions, with a light lunch in between sessions.

The first session addresses what the Bible says about itself and how every Christian is called to relate to the Scriptures. It is our confidence as we make our way through the broad sweep of Old and New Testaments, that those participating will become inspired and convinced that in order to have a right relationship with the Bible (according to God's will as seen in the Bible itself) that memorizing portions and keeping them fresh in one's mind is absolutely essential. It is our hope and prayer that all will come out of this session eager to memorize Scripture.

The second session then will teach everyone – no matter how old or how young and no matter how bad your memory appears to you – how to memorize portions of the Bible and tuck them away in your memory according to topics so they will be most useful in your life and in the ministry God has for you.

This session will seek to be very practical and straightforward so that everyone participating can leave the workshop with a plan for memorizing the Bible using the Topical Memorizing System which comes from the Navigators ministry.

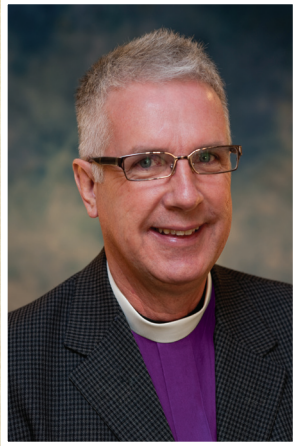
